With the rapid advancements in artificial intelligence (AI) technologies and their increasing integration into various aspects of human life, it has become more relevant than ever to develop an integrated understanding of the legal implications and challenges that arise in an international context.

Recent multilateral discussions have separately been considering the impacts of AI in different areas such as human rights, privacy, intellectual property, warfare, peace and security, or the role of AI in fostering the implementation of the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs.) One of the common denominators in these debates is the need for stronger international governance of AI.

However, an integrated perspective about two issues is lacking: a) the implications of AI for the future of international law and; b) the principles that should govern the responses to present and emerging challenges in this sphere.

Against this backdrop, the side event will, on the one hand, seek to identify the most pressing and transformative legal challenges brought about by AI in an international context and, on the other, promote an exchange of views on the type of conceptual framework that is warranted when devising the necessary responses to such challenges.
