Background

In accordance with paragraph 30 of the General Assembly resolution A/RES/71/280, the President of the General Assembly is organizing a series of informal interactive multi-stakeholder hearings as part of the preparatory process for the intergovernmental conference on international migration to adopt the global compact for safe, orderly and regular migration.

The second informal interactive multi-stakeholder hearing will be organized at the United Nations Office in Geneva on 11 October 2017. The first informal interactive multi-stakeholder hearing took place at the United Nations Headquarters in New York on 26 July 2017.

Objectives and expected outcomes

The President of the General Assembly will issue a summary of the hearing. This summary will be made available as an input for the intergovernmental negotiations on the global migration compact.

The second hearing will focus on the issues addressed in the fifth informal thematic sessions, held by the General Assembly in September 2017, and the issues to be addressed in the sixth thematic session, which will be organized following the second informal interactive multi-stakeholder hearing. The second informal interactive multi-stakeholder hearing will also focus on regional perspectives on migration during the afternoon part of the meeting.

The Secretary-General's issue briefs prepared for the fifth and sixth thematic sessions provide insight, food for thought and recommendations on the topics to be discussed during the hearing. In addition, participants are encouraged to consult the summary of the fifth informal thematic sessions prepared by the co-facilitators, who are leading the intergovernmental consultations and negotiations, in particular the areas they identified as needing further discussion.

Participation

The hearing is intended for representatives of non-governmental organizations, civil society organizations, academic institutions, diaspora groups, migrant organizations and the private sector, which are in consultative status with the Economic and Social Council or have received a special accreditation to participate in the preparatory process.

In addition, the hearing is intended for representatives of parliaments and national human rights institutions compliant with the Paris Principles.

Member States are invited and encouraged to participate in the hearing.

Structure of the hearing

The informal interactive multi-stakeholder hearing will consist of an opening and a closing segment and three interactive panel discussions.

A preliminary programme of the hearing is enclosed.

Each panel discussion will feature short introductory remarks from the moderator, followed by remarks of each of the panelists and an interactive exchange with interventions from the floor. Each panel will be guided by a set of suggested topics for discussion, as contained in the enclosed detailed programme.

The selection of panelists and moderators takes into account regional and gender considerations, with a diversity of expertise and ages.

Panelists, moderators as well as speakers from the floor are encouraged to focus their statements on concrete recommendations for the global compact for safe, orderly and regular migration.

Interventions from the floor will be strictly limited to three minutes.

There will be no formal list of speakers for the hearing.

Stakeholder representatives interested in making a statement are invited to express their interest immediately prior to the beginning of the meeting or by requesting the floor from their seat.

Logistical arrangements

Stakeholders wishing to participate must have applied to attend this session by 4 September. Those approved who do not possess a UN Grounds Pass will receive a special event pass.

Approved participants must present a national identification card or passport to receive their special event pass at the UN Office in Geneva. This pass can be picked up between 8 AM to 5PM at the Pregny Gates. Participants with a special event pass must present a national identification card or passport.

Participants are encouraged to arrive in due time prior to the start of the session to collect their passes.

This special event pass will also allow access to the sixth thematic session, which will be organized on 12 – 13 October 2017.
