NARRATION

Prossy Anena is just fifteen. She does her school work diligently, and like almost any Ugandan girl her age, she helps her mother in their small garden and prepares food for her siblings. (13")

Prossy, like many Northern Ugandan children, has suffered a terrible trauma. She was abducted by the Lord's Resistance Army and for two years was kept away from her family. (12")

PROSSY ANENA (LUO, ACHOLI DIALECT)

"I was abducted from our village at Unyama. We were about 11 children that were abducted and the rebels decided to release some people. But I was one of those who were not released." (12")

NARRATION

She had to baby sit the rebel's children and carry heavy loads. She was constantly on the move and had to loot food from villagers to keep from starving. (9,5")

The effect of the conflict on children in Uganda is hard to quantify, and according to social worker, Lydia Anne, for some of the girls their lives may never get back on track. (11”)

Prossy’s release was accidental. She was shot in the foot and left for dead by her captors. The Ugandan military came to her aid. Though she missed two years of her life, she went back to finish primary school. She wants to be a nurse. (16”)
