W/S WOMEN IN PARLIAMENT

NARRATION

Thirty-six of the 118 parliamentary seats went to women after the July elections. There are now 17 female senators and the Vice President of the Republic and the President of the National Assembly are both women. (12.5")

WOMAN PLANTING

But for Burundian women, the seeds of their success were planted long before the adoption of resolution 1325. (6.5")

WOMEN AT PEACE MARCH

Women in Burundi sought an active role in rebuilding their country after the 1993 civil war broke out. They fought for inclusion in peace negotiations during the late 1990's. (10")
